Pearson and her husband, Robert, are the parents of Sgt. Brice Pearson, a 32-year-old paratrooper from Avondale who was killed in Iraq on April 23. His name is on the T-shirt. advertisement

On the surface, Frazier and Pearson should have nothing in common. Nothing good, anyway. Nothing positive. But they do. They each desperately want us to look beneath the surface.

"What something like that (the T-shirt controversy) does is to put the war in the public view," Beth said. "When Brice was home in March on leave, his biggest comment was, 'Gee, you'd never know that we're at war.' People like to argue about the war. But it's all very clean. If you don't have a loved one over there fighting, it's as if it doesn't exist. You can ignore it."

Not if someone comes walking by in one of Frazier's in-your-face T-shirts.

Last week, U.S. District Judge Neil Wake issued a preliminary injunction that prevents the law aimed at Frazier from being implemented. Among other things, Wake wrote, "The nation's

"We need to have this war in our faces, not someplace where we get to ignore it," she said. She had written an e-mail to me earlier in the week, talking about public apathy toward the war and particularly toward the soldiers fighting it. She said Brice and his father were big Arizona State University football fans, adding, "Why not have a moment of silence at every game? Every public event? At the beginning of every school day? If you want to express your political views, fine. But also send a care package to our troops. Tell them you are proud of them and that you appreciate their service. It's the least we can do." The lack of connection that most of us have to the war, the apathy, is something that Beth notices every day. And it's one of the reasons that Frazier says that he makes his T-shirts.
