

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## Ankeny schools

Crocker

There will be no school May 26 due to Memorial Day.

Our last day for students will be May 28. We will be dismissing at 12:50 p.m. The last teacher day will be May 29.

Report cards will be sent home with your child on May 28.

Fourth- and fifth-grade AELP students participated in a Creativity Carnival on May 6. They received directions, materials, and a time limit in which to stretch their creative and critical thinking skills in order to create a tall tower of power and an interesting story to explain it. Al Neppl, the assistant principal, judged the activity.

First-graders have learned how to play a game called Race for \$1. The goal is to be the first player to get to \$1. Students roll the die to determine how much money to take. Then they count the coins and record their total amount. Students trade for a nickel when they get five pennies, trade for a dime when they get two nickels, and trade for a quarter when they get two dimes and a nickel. This continues until one player reaches \$1 and wins.

Second-graders have finished their math study of subtraction with regrouping and will go to place value through the hundreds place next. They put their brains to work when addition and subtraction problems were mixed, some requiring regrouping.

The Ankeny Fire Department brought the fire safety house to third grade on May 12. The students were allowed to practice safely

"We originally hoped to send 33 care packages, but our school really went all out and now we are sending over 60 care packages." When students were asked why they brought items, student Mark Voyna said, "Il brought Twizzlers for the soldiers and maybe they'll share them with some of the kids in Iraq, too." Student Brittney Silvey said, "My mom and I donated a sack of items because we wanted to help somebody out." The next task that the SLC group faces is getting the funding to ship the boxes. Each flat rate box costs \$10.95 to ship. Originally the group planned on collecting \$360 to send the care packages. Now it will cost the group \$660 to send all of the packages. "It's a great problem to have, I am so proud of the students and teachers for their generosity," Webster states. Collections are being taken at the school to meet the shipping costs.
